Explorations In Color:

Three Artists Reveal How Color Can Convey Message, Mood and Meaning

The Montminy Gallery is proud to announce, *Explorations In Color*. The show will be on display from September 7 to November 3 and highlights the works of three local artists, Jenn Wiggs, John Fennell and Scott Patrick Myers.

Color is integral to all visual art and is a primary vehicle of each artist to convey message, mood and meaning. Whether influenced by nature or by imagination, this show captures three different creative approaches and perspectives of how color is used to create impactful artwork.

Painter, Jenn Wiggs gravitates toward abstract work. Her work is influenced by the abstract nature of jazz combined with her love of color. Chicago native and painter,

John Fennell, will exhibit three separate categories of color: Pure Color (abstract work), Color from Nature (landscapes), Urban-Inspired Color (city-oriented images).

Photographer, Scott Patrick Myers, uses bold colors, abstract compositions and large-scaled work, all together, to encourage an in-depth look at nature and say "Look at this. It is real. It is important." By focusing on the natural world, his art draws attention to the essential wildness of everyday existence.



Heritage Festival: Volunteers Needed to Help Community Experience Local History

The only way history can come to life in Nifong Park each year for the Annual Heritage Festival & Craft Show is with your help! Volunteers ensure that the Boone County History & Culture Center and its historic buildings are open for the community to experience the past at this annual two-day event, September 21-22.

The Center is seeking roughly 100 volunteers to help visitors learn more about Boone County's cultural heritage. They will play a variety of roles ranging from helping with tours in the Historic Maplewood House and the Village at Boone Junction to answering questions and assisting with museum store sales at the front desk.



The Heritage Festival is a wonderful opportunity to ensure that the next generation of Boone Countians learns the value of exploring local history through FREE tours of historic structures. The Maplewood House, Gordon Log Cabin, Easley Country Store, Ryland House, McQuitty House and the River Horse Pavilion are all open for the public to enjoy. But this depends on the help of people just like you—volunteers who are a friendly face and a watchful eye to ensure that our guests, these historic buildings and the artifacts within them remain safe.

The main building of the History & Culture Center will feature the new exhibition, *She Got the Vote*, which commemorates the centennial of the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution and the centennial of the Columbia's Women's League of Voters. The continuing exhibit, *Faces Found—Boone County Portraits 1886-1940*, is a nationally recognized multimedia exhibition that showcases fabulous examples of Columbia's earliest photographers' work, photo equipment of the time and period clothing.—Continued on Page 4

What's Happening at the History & Culture Center?

•We're pleased to remind you that there is a terrific way to honor a prominent, former Boone County, **Henry Kirklin**. Kirklin, a famous African American farmer, entrepreneur, and educator, is buried in the Columbia Cemetery and his grave is unmarked. The Boone County Historical Society has teamed with the Columbia Center for Urban Agriculture, The Friends of the Historic Columbia Cemetery, the Sharp End Heritage Committee and the University of Missouri's College of Agriculture to raise funds for a Henry Kirklin headstone through a GoFundMe.com page. Our goal is \$12,000. The funds will be used for the headstone, landscaping around the headstone, and a marker at the new Columbia Farmers Market. Donations can be made at gofundme.com/f/kirklin.

•BCHS member and retired local attorney **David Knight** has gen-

erously pledged a gift to the Center that will allow for the repaving of our front parking lot. The gift came after an attempt to obtain the majority of the full cost—\$58,000—from a local trust foundation. The combination of a \$10,000 grant from the **Heinkel Charitable Trust** and David's gift are almost equal to the full cost, which meant that we were able to contract with Christensen Asphalt after a competitive bid process. The project is scheduled to begin in Spring 2020. It should be mentioned that David utilized a required minimum distribution from retirement funds to execute this donation. Readers—will you be making a decision regarding your required minimum distribution this fall or winter? If so, please consider following David's wonderful example and supporting BCHS with a portion of your retirement funds.

•The Merline Tennyson Estate made a \$25,000 gift to the Society's endowment fund recently. We are grateful for this wonderful sur-

prise, and we hope all of our members are considering BCHS when contemplating their own estate plans. Please contact our office if you have any question regarding a legacy gift.

•We are delighted to announce that **Axie Hindman** has donated several pieces of memorabilia that represent the career of our former mayor, the late **Darwin Hindman**.

•Tickets are available now for the Monday, September 30 concert featuring **Madi Mertz** and co-producer **Michelle Curry**. This will be the fifth of six concerts this year, with the last scheduled on December 9. If you like Broadway and American Standards, you will enjoy these two local talents.

- Large recycling containers in our building for bottles, cans, etc.—about \$350 each.


- U.S. flag replacement for the Wulff Flag Garden—about \$100 each. (We need five new flags by October.)

Explore Route 66 on September 14 with Acclaimed Historian Susan Croce Kelly

Have you ever wondered about the history of America's most famous highway, Route 66? Its 2,400 miles stretched from Chicago to Los Angeles. It was known as America's main street, or the Will Roger's Highway, or even as the Mother Road. To this day, the celebrated roadway remains a national fascination, celebrated with parades, festivals, and attractions. Our inaugural author, following the new partnership between Barnes & Noble and the Center to produce the Meet the Author series, is the foremost expert on all things Route 66, Susan Croce Kelly.

Kelly grew up in St. Louis hearing stories about Route 66 from her mother, who spent her childhood in Southwest Missouri. In 1979 her fascination began to grow into something more. By this time she was already a prolific journalist and historian. She met photographer Quinta Scott, and over the next year and 225 interviews, they put together "Route 66, the Highway and Its People" (University of Oklahoma Press, 1988). This collaboration drew the attention of the Wall Street Journal. You could say that she was a leading force in the resurgence of interest in Route 66.

Her most recent book is the story of Oklahoma businessman and politician, Cy Avery, the father of Route 66. Avery was a visionary, and the book tells of his efforts with the national interstate highway. Kelly is a popular presenter on the subject of Route 66.

“Faces Found” exhibit

Eugene Clark Beal: “Important Cog in the Teamwork of the Kewpies”

This photograph by Henry Holborn was taken of Eugene Beal while “Gene” was a student at Columbia High School. The Beal family moved to Columbia in early 1919, not long before this photograph of Eugene was taken, yet he quickly made himself an integral part of Kewpie athletics, especially basketball and track.

Eugene lettered in basketball his junior and senior years and eventually served as Secretary-Treasurer of that organization’s “C” Club. By the fall of his senior year he was also captain of the basketball team.

The 1921 *Cresset* yearbook summarizes him as “Captain and forward. Gene’s strong point was his ability to cover the floor and was an important cog in the teamwork of the Kewpies”.

Following his graduation from Columbia High School in 1921, Eugene enrolled at the University of Missouri and graduated in 1925.

The Savitar indicates he was a member of Scabbard and Blade, the Rifle Team and Delta Phi Delta.

By 1931, Eugene and his wife, Mary Ann, were living in South Bend, Indiana where he was employed as an artist with the John Baumgarth Co. of Chicago. In

1940 he was living in Ferguson, Missouri with his wife and two daughters, Sharon and Sandy. Their address was 300 Roberta Avenue. He worked as a commercial artist with the Universal Watch Company. In 1951 the family moved to California and for many years they lived at 131 Pamela Drive, Arcadia.

Eugene Beal passed away on November 20, 1976, in Arcadia just a few months following his wife’s death. His obituary gives no additional information about his career but lists his surviving children as Brent Beal, Sharon Ames, and Sandra Bryan, seven grandchildren and one great grandchild. He and his wife are buried in Rose Hills Memorial Park in Whittier, California.

Eugene was born November 25, 1902 in Kansas City, Missouri to William M. Beal and Hattie Gertrude Davis, both natives of New York.

Eugene’s father William was a cigar merchant in 1910 in Kansas City, but by 1920 the family was living at 901 College Avenue in Columbia, and William was a life insurance salesman. William Mitchell Beal, father, was born in East Palmyra, New York and died in 1949 in Kansas City, Missouri.

She Got the Vote: New Exhibit Illustrates Local Activism

To commemorate the centennial of the 19th Amendment to the United States Constitution and the centennial of the Columbia and Boone County League of Women Voters (LWV), the new exhibition *She Got the Vote* is now open for visitors. The display will run through September 2020 and features many items lent by the local LWV. The exhibit also showcases clothing from our own textiles collection; specifically three white dresses and yellow sashes from the era. During the suffrage movement era, white represented purity and virtue, and gold was a nod to the sunflower of Kansas where Susan B. Anthony and Elizabeth Cady Stanton campaigned.

Did you know Columbia had its own organization for promoting women’s voting rights in the early 1900s? The membership of this group, the Columbia Equal Suffrage League, was not confined to women. In fact, the first president was Dr. R. H. Jesse, who had recently served as president of University of Missouri.

In their inaugural meeting on November 16, 1912, Mrs. Helen McNabb, (Helen Guthrie Miller) presented a program on universal suffrage. Miller was elected chair of the executive board of this group and Luella Wilcox St. Clair, then president of Christian College (now Columbia College), was elected vice-president.

Our scanning software has been successfully updated in the digital lab. The process was very quick and painless! There are a couple of new features in the software such as having the ability to "erase" the gutter of a book and place a virtual grid over an item to be scanned for alignment purposes. There are notes that indicate other features will work more smoothly than in the past.

I'd like to sing the praises of volunteers because they bring such an array of expertise to the History & Culture Center. In the lab, we have photography enthusiasts and professionals who bring decades of working knowledge to the camera room. They suggest the best techniques for taking photos, storing electronic photos, handling original photos, repairing images and more.

Our other faction of volunteers is keen on detail and has curiosity for researching and documenting, accurately, the identities of the photos we are processing. They also create spreadsheets of information that will become the online record of the images. Almost daily we come across a new idea for doing our work in a better, more efficient way.

Each time we open a box of negatives that hasn't been touched for decades, it is an adventure. We recently digitized Sam Walton's school photo. Who knows what or whom we will find next week?!
