Hall of Fame: Three New Enshrinees Honored at Gala, Added to Boone County Hall of Fame

The Boone County Historical Society's Endowment Trustees hosted their 12th annual Boone County Hall of Fame *History Makers Gala* on Oc-

tober 27, in the Kimball Ballroom on the Stephens College campus.

The evening added three new members to the Boone County Hall of Fame: Charles Morgenthaler (posthumous recipient), the Food Bank for Central & Northeast Missouri (organization recipient) and retired Colonel John Clark, USAF (living recipient).

Each enshrinee was introduced by an originally produced minidocumentary centered on showcasing their lasting contributions within the county and beyond.

Join us at 1 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 14 for the next *Things That Matter* event featuring Gary R. Kremer, the executive director of the State Historical Society of Missouri (SHSMO). He'll enlighten us with a discussion of "Persistent Problems in Missouri History."

As a fifth-generation Missourian and SHSMO's executive director since 2004, Kremer is highly qualified to help broaden our understanding of reoccurring trends in the Show-Me State.

Kremer earned his Ph.D. from American University in Washington, DC. He has written, coauthored, and coedited 12 books. Previously, Kremer taught history at Lincoln University in Jefferson City (1972-1987) and William Woods University in Fulton (1991-2004). He also served as the state archivist of Missouri from 1987 to 1991 before his tenure started at SHSMO.

Things That Matter aims to produce a series that is inclusive of all voices and creates a safe space for all to feel heard. It is a free, conversational-style speaker series hosted from 1:00-2:00 p.m. once monthly on Thursdays in the History & Culture Center's Montminy Gallery. No RSVP is required.

The Boone County Hall of Fame is central Missouri's only civic hall of fame, and its current roster lists 73 Hall of Famers that have been inducted since the first class in 1995.

The living recipient, Clark, is a 1957 graduate of Hickman High and a 1961 alum of the MU engineering school.

Clark flew more than 60 missions over North Vietnam when he was downed by anti-aircraft fire on March 12, 1967. He was captured almost immediately by swarms of militia and imprisoned. At home, Clark was listed as missing in action and presumed dead. It wasn't until his first letter arrived three and a half years later that his family learned he had survived and was a prisoner of war in North Vietnam. Clark was held for nearly six years until he was finally released on February 18, 1973.

Clark retired as a colonel in the Air Force. He earned the Silver Star, two Legions of Merit, two Purple Hearts, the Distinguished Flying Cross, six Air Medals as well as other medals and honors.

The Food Bank for Central & Northeast Missouri, 2023 organization recipient, provides food to 100,000 people a month across 32 counties. The Food Bank distributes millions of pounds of food annually. They work with nearly 200 schools and more than 145 food pantries, soup kitchens, shelters and other agencies to get food to those who need it most. The Food Bank shares 23 million meals with Missouri citizens each year.

Renowned artist Morgenthaler (1893 - 1980) is the posthumous honoree. He was born in Hallsville, Missouri, graduated from Columbia High School and graduated from the Art Institute of Chicago in 1928.

Morgenthaler's varied skills led to opportunities creating illustrations for hundreds of newspapers, books and advertising companies. Morgenthaler restored murals at the Missouri State Capitol dome (1951), the St. Louis' Old Courthouse (1955) and the Cyclorama

at Gettysburg National Battlefield (1960).

Morgenthaler volunteered to sketch service members at military hospitals for the United Service Organizations (USO) in 1946-47. He was one of only six artists asked to travel to Germany for this project. He continued in this role during the Korean War drawing over 1,400 military personnel in all.

Book Event: Ruby: Magic Comes from the Heart





I want to take time as gallery director to share my goals for Montminy Gallery in the coming years. What I hope to accomplish is based on Tracy Montminy's legacy and our wishes to exhibit both her and Pierre's artwork as well as contemporary local, national and international artists. I rely on my professional skills and ongoing research in building community through art experiences across cultures and social groups.

My strategic plan aligns with the National Endowment for the Arts which states, "The NEA will model diversity, equity, inclusion and accessibility in the arts through all its activities and operations." I will outline how Montminy Gallery will address each of these areas to benefit artists and enrich our community beginning with the Exhibition Plan.

Diversity is very much a part of Columbia, Missouri. How much we increase our awareness and learn about other cultures through their artwork! With exhibitions that highlight individually the many various cultures that make up our demographics, we share their story while also creating a sense of belonging. People are more inclined to visit a museum in which they see themselves as part of the story.

I plan to have juried exhibits that follow a call for art to equitably serve our community. These exhibits allow for widespread and varied participation. Depending on the theme of these exhibitions, we can reach a broad range of artists with a wide variety of styles, techniques, and materials.

Building relationships with underserved communities promotes inclusivity. We foster acceptance and understanding by providing access and opportunities for marginalized artists to exhibit their works in our premier gallery.

Providing accessibility will be an ongoing process and is already an integral part of Boone County History & Culture Center. Contemporary museum practices have developed new ways to give access and encourage patrons with disabilities to appreciate art.

These values—diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility—are closely linked and often overlap. By intentionally planning and building on these basic concepts, Montminy Gallery continues into the future as a principle art venue in this community.
