

Your New Board President and Vice President

Incoming board president, Earl Coleman, is a renowned musician who has contributed to the success of many other musicians and as an especially impactful teacher and educator for more than five decades.

A Springfield Missouri Parkview High School graduate, Coleman attended the University of Missouri on a full scholarship and began studying instrumental performance as a violinist. He would add vocals to his studies and eventually earned one



bachelor's degree and two master's degrees in voice and violin performance and education.

The seasoned baritone, who has sung with more than 60 orchestras, also trained at the Juilliard School, the University of Michigan, and the Aspen Music Festival. He has taught at several schools across the country, including Hickman High School in Columbia, The Barstow School in Stephens College, Kansas City, Columbia College (MO),the University of Missouri, the University of Michigan (Dean of the School of Music), and finally, Columbus State University (Dean of the College of the Arts).

In 2007, Coleman's friends, family and former students established the Earl Coleman Music Scholarship in MU's School of Music.

In 2010, he was selected as one of four Master Teachers for the National Intern Program of the National Association of Teachers of Singing—a lifetime designation. In 2020 Coleman was inducted into the Springfield public schools' Hall of Fame. Coleman's former students have been nominated for the Oscar, Emmy, Grammy and Tony awards and performed in opera houses, musical theaters and symphonies across the country.

Coleman recently retired and moved back to Columbia, which he says, "feels like home."

Incoming board vice president, **David Wilson**, is a fourth-generation resident of Columbia, Missouri, David Wilson co-founded the Ragtag Film Society in 1998 and led the organization in the creation of both the Ragtag Cinema (2000) and the True/False Film Fest (2004). As co-director of True/False, he served as a panelist, moderator, and juror at festivals including Sundance, The



Toronto Film Festival, and the Busan International Film Festival. Wilson also consulted with The National Endowment for the Arts, the Creative Capital Foundation, and ITVS, among others.

In 2016, Wilson became the

youngest person ever to be awarded an honorary Doctorate by the University of Missouri Columbia. As a filmmaker, Wilson's work has been internationally screened and PBS. His broadcast on debut feature. We Always Lie Strangers, was awarded the special jury prize for Directing at the 2013 SXSW Film Festival, and his short, Crown Candy, received the award for best short documentary at the 2018 St. Louis Film Festival.

Wilson is a 1992 graduate of Rock Bridge High School and a 1996 graduate of Hampshire College.

The Beginnings of the Boone County Historical Society

As the Boone County Historical Society (BCHS) prepares to turn 100 years old it seems timely to examine our founders and their goals in creating a society focused on local history.

I emphasize local history because when the BCHS was founded in 1924, Columbia was already home to

the State Historical Society of Missouri (SHSMO), founded in 1898. It is remarkable that many of the same men who had a hand in founding the state-wide organization, headquartered here in Columbia would, 26 years later, organize our society focused on Boone County.

The societies share their first President, newspaperman and civic leader: E.W. Stephens. It was on his call that both organizations were founded. Unusually, Stephens had taken an interest in local historical matters at a young age, authoring the first published writings on the early history of Columbia and Boone County in 1869 and later in 1882, assisting William Switzler in his monumental History of Boone County, Missouri.

It was natural for a newspaperman, whose daily work was in part documenting history as it happened, to take an interest in historical matters; and Stephens was not just a newspaperman, but also from an old (and wealthy) Boone County family whose roots go back to the very beginnings of Columbia.

Before formal historical societies in Missouri, many counties and cities had "Old Settlers Associations." Boone was no different. These groups functioned primarily as social clubs where old men (and no doubt women though they are rarely recorded) could reminisce about the early 1800s and the American settlement of the frontier. Stephens, who lived his whole life in Columbia, knew many of the "old settlers" personally and no doubt absorbed their oral histories and folktales.

Beyond Stephens' individual talent, he always showed a knack for surrounding himself with competent, educated, leaders. When SHSMO was founded in 1898, it was Stephens' protegee, Walter Williams, who would be appointed its first treasurer; and MU Professor of History, Isador Loeb, its first secretary. Stephens, Williams, and Loeb would secure SHSMO a headquarters in Columbia on the University of Missouri campus and spend the next couple of decades nurturing the fledgling society.

E. W Stephens Diary Entry on July 16, 1924

There were a handful of formal local historical societies formed in these early years, often as auxiliaries of SHSMO, but many only lasted a few years. Fortunately for us, when the BCHS formed in 1924 with 18 charter members, among them were Stephens, Williams, and Loeb. I should note here that a Columbia Daily Tribune article published on July 16, 1924 (the day BCHS was founded) asserts there were 17 charter members, but proceeds to list 18 men. E.W. Stephens' diary entry for the same day confirms there were 18 original charter members.

Stephens, Williams, and Loeb, who by this point had decades of experience leading SHSMO, would have been familiar with successes and failures of handful of local historical societies that existed prior to the 1920s; and the BCHS no doubt benefited from this advantage. Also remarkable are the qualifications of the other charter members which would include former а U.S. Congressperson, a future Missouri Supreme Court Justice, and no less

than 4 full professors of history! It is

fitting that in a town dominated by educators the first actions of the society were a series of educational trips to important historical sites in the development of the county.

It is this emphasis on history being experienced, discussed, and applied that the Boone County Historical Society has inherited today; beyond being a mere depository of relics and records, the society actively preserves history in the minds of Boone Countians, an intent of our founders that will remain consistent for the next 100 years.

"I'm so happy to be a part of this organization, where I can continue to use my communication skills but also incorporate my love of history and apprecia-




