

BCHS Will Be 100 Years Old in pursuing that mission in 2023 and I must believe that those seventeen

Well, the headline pretty much says it all. If you didn't already know, our beloved organization will be 100 years old on July 16, 2024, and we're going to have a year-long party to celebrate.

Our organization began at a luncheon in the Daniel Boone Tavern on July 16, 1924. (see the *Tribune* article that was published that evening on page 3). Seventeen men came together with the purpose of creating an organization that would "preserve the history of Boone County and the achievements of the pioneers who laid the foundation of this county community so solidly." We are still

pursuing that mission in 2023 and I must believe that those seventeen men, led by our first president, E.W. Stephens, would be proud to see where we are today. Many things have changed since 1924, and for the better, particularly the role of women in our organization. Women were notably absent from the list of charter members, but I feel certain the women who should have been included in 1924, such as Mary Paxton Keelev and Luella St. Clair Moss, would be pleased to know that of our 26 board directors and endowment trustees in 2023, 24 are women. What has not changed in the last 99 years is our mission and purpose.

In the last 99 years, we have transitioned the organization's regular meetings from members' living rooms to the Maplewood House—our society's headquarters and office

space from 1971 through 1989-and then to the Boone County History & Culture Center in 1990. Over the course of the last 99 years, and primarily the last 30 years, the organization has collected approximately 516,000 community photographs, 10,000 artifacts, 2,200 articles of clothing, and 2,000 works of art. Additionally, the society, founded when Calvin Coolidge was president and movies didn't yet have sound, now curates four historic venues in the "Village at Boone Junction," and the historic Maplewood House. We've come a long way.

The Centennial Committee began making celebration plans early this summer —continued on page 3.

erwise know we are here. Among the activities planned there will be an exhibit showing off 100 years of historical items from our vaults. Some of these items have not been part of a public exhibit for many, many years.

It takes a lot of time, effort, and money to bring our history to life through these types of programs and exhibits. Your ongoing support is needed to continue to provide a place where we celebrate all that is Boone County—past, present, and future.

Join us at 1 p.m. on Thursday, Dec. 14 for the next *Things That Matter* event featuring Gary R. Kremer, the executive director of the State Historical Society of Missouri (SHSMO). He'll enlighten us with a discussion of "Persistent Problems in Missouri History."

As a fifth-generation Missourian and SHSMO's executive director since 2004, Kremer is highly qualified to help broaden our understanding of reoccurring trends in the Show-Me State.

Kremer earned his Ph.D. from American University in Washington, DC. He has written, coauthored, and coedited 12 books. Previously, Kremer taught history at Lincoln University in Jefferson City (1972-1987) and William Woods University in Fulton (1991-2004). He also served as the state archivist of Missouri from 1987 to 1991 before his tenure started at SHSMO.

Things That Matter aims to produce a series that is inclusive of all voices and creates a safe space for all to feel heard. It is a free, conversational-style speaker series hosted from 1:00-2:00 p.m. once monthly on Thursdays in the History & Culture Center's Montminy Gallery. No RSVP is required.


Article appearing on page 1 of the July 16, 1924, issue of the Columbia Daily Tribune announcing the formation of the Boone County Historical Society.

The Boone County Historical Society is the result of a call of E. W. Stephens. The object is the preservation of the history of Poone county and the achievements of the pioneers who laid the foundation of this county community so solidly and builded so well upon it. The society will collect and preserve matters of interest and preserve them for 1938 et 1977, and the subject matter will relate to pectic as well as events.

Mr. Stephens, after an enjoyable lunch, in a short talk stated that the ideal of organizing the society came originally from Dr. J. W. Connoway upon an occasion when he and the acctor were talking of old times. The discussion developed into the project of a society to consummate what has been mentioned above.

Mr. Stephens outlined what lethought would be the proper scope and work of the organization. Among the sentures of the society will be visits to the principal historical points in Econe county and its environs. The first of these trips will be undertaken Monday next. William Jewell grave yard, where lie the remains of William Jewell-virile and constructive pioneer of Boone county, and Charles H. Hardin, governor of Missouri, will be the first objective. McBaine, near where Perche creek delivers itself into the Missouri, named Roche Perche by the Franch who pioneered in Cooper and original Howard county, out of which Boone was carved, will be the second stop. Rocheport will come next, near where a view of five of the pioneer counties of central Missouri may be had. Then on to Arrow Rock, with dinner at the historic inn there, now under the protection of the Daughters of the American Revolution; thence to old Boon's Lick Spring, in Boone county, where Daniel Boone and a son are said to have sojourned a while and manufactured salt from its waters; thence to old Fort Cooper on Thrall's Prairie, where the first village in Boone county was located and called Lexing-

Other interesting projects will be planned from which profit will result from pleasure. The meetings of the society will be once a month.

Meet the New Board Candidates

Up for election to the Boone County Historical Society Board of Directors are two new candidates that are familiar faces around the History & Culture Center. Both Jerry Benedict and Jolene Schulz are wonderful volunteers for BCHS and we look forward to their expanded commitment to the Center by their election to the Board.

Members will vote on Benedict and Schulz, up for new 3-year terms, as well as returning directors Nancy W. Thomas and Elizabeth Watkins, up for reelection to 3-year terms, at the Annual Meeting on December 7 in the Montminy Gallery from 5-6:30 p.m. Learn more on page 8 about the BCHS Annual Meeting.

Jerry Benedict was born at Noyes Hospital in 1946 as Winston Churchill was a few miles away coining the Iron Curtain speech. His mother forever associated the two of them, although Churchill never got the connection.

Growing up, Benedict worked in his father's orthopedic business, Central Brace Company. Through his tutelage and inspiration he held that interest while attending first the University of Missouri and later Drury University where he majored in History and English. Benedict's pathway led to years of advanced studies and certification by the American Orthotic and Prosthetic

Association.

Benedict eventually took the helm of his family's business. It was their acquisition of the building on East Broadway that included Francis Westhoff's Portrait Studio that was a milestone in Benedict's life. The fate of half a million photographic negatives of Columbia residents dating from the late nineteenth century through 1970 had to be preserved. Through good people and good fortune, those half million faces that were stored under a stairwell are safely in the vaults of BCHS. Since retiring in 2018, Benedict has been volunteering to digitize these images for posterity in the Henry "Hank" J. Waters III Digital Imaging Lab.

A lifetime supporter of the We Always Swing Jazz Series, Benedict served on their board for five years. Benedict was also a member of CoMo Preservation's board at their inception and served on their Outreach committee.

Jolene Schulz earned an associate's degree from Christian College (now Columbia College) in 1961, followed by a bachelor's and master's of education from the University of Missouri. She has taught kindergarteners and college students alike, including some at Columbia College and the University of Missouri, where she served as an adjunct professor for both institutions. Schulz

served 34 years as a teacher and administrator for Columbia Public Schools. Her last position was Director of Communications and School Community Programs.

Schulz has held board positions with many organizations, including National Association of Partners in Education, Central Missouri Food Bank, Mid-Missouri Leadership Board of Directors, Missouri Community Service Commission (appointed by the Governor), National Association of States Service Association (appointed as a representative for—continued on page 7.
