


# **Centennial Celebrations Planned for 100th Year**

Coming Soon – A Special Centennial Celebration! This celebration includes a *Popsicle Fest* themed party on July 13; history and art exhibits and *Boone-Anza* treasure hunt with a \$25,000 prize of diamonds and gems sponsored by Buchroeders Jewelry. We look forward to starting our next century of celebrating Boone County's art, history, and culture with you during this grand one hundredth year! We will be celebrating our heritage all year long.

In July of 1924, Boone Countians could find a notice in the newspaper for a 15 room, furnished house for sale at only \$12,000. The locals were also reading about the opening of the Olympic Summer Games in Paris. Fundraising for Memorial Union and Memorial Stadium at MU was underway, and Barth's Clothing was advertising men's suits for as little as \$18. That month marked the gathering of 18 local leaders, educators, and historians. They were uniformly of the mind that Boone County should have a "historical society." They accom-

plished that goal when on July 16 at the Daniel Boone Hotel & Tavern, they formed the organization over lunch and then began to schedule and promote historic tours of county sites.

This year the Boone County Historical Society (BCHS) will celebrate its 100th birthday. Much has changed for the organization over the last 100 years. The organization received its non-profit status in 1963, and made the historic Lenoir home, Maplewood House, its headquarters in 1971. Thanks to the community's financial support, BCHS built its first museum space in 1990. The 19,000-square-foot museum in Frank G. Nifong Memorial Park is now known as the Boone County History & Culture Center.

The Center, free and open to the public Wednesdays through Saturdays, has opened its doors to countless programs, tours, exhibitions, and special events. Just last year, 11,800 Boone Countians and visitors spent time at the History and Culture Center and the adjacent Village at Boone Junction.

Some of the commemorative events planned for this year include two special centennial exhibits at the History & Culture Center, and a *Popsicle Fest* on July 13. Our history exhibition this year – *100 Years*, *100 Objects* – celebrates our centennial birthday with a fantastic array of artifacts, garments, and photographs. Our goal is to showcase the 100 most cool, most fantastic, most fascinating objects in our collection vaults!

#### **Centennial Events Continued**

The Montminy Gallery will also be marking our organization's 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary with an exhibit titled, *Over Time: 100 Years of Art Scene/Seen in Boone County*, and it will open on June 22 and run through September 7, 2024. *Over Time* begins with Tracy Montminy's artworks and brings us forward into the contemporary art scene. Exhibited artworks will be from a selection of artists, educators, curators, and collectors who have helped or are currently helping shape the visual arts in our community.

Opening on April 10 and running through January 2025, the 100 Years, 100 Objects exhibition is a must-see for every family in Boone County. The exhibition will include a 1925 Ford Model T, an 1880s covered wagon, John W. "Blind" Boone's diamondencrusted gold pocket watch, Jane Froman's fur coat, a Civil War soldier's diary, letters penned by two American Presidents, and much more.

The *Popsicle Fest* will be a free, family-oriented event with food and live music that gives a nod to another 100th anniversary – the 1924 invention of the popsicle. Every guest will receive a free popsicle.

We also look forward to the July launch of a unique event that will challenge contestant's puzzling skills and Boone County knowledge. The *Boone-anza!* Centennial Treasure Hunt will reward the winner with \$25,000 worth of diamonds and gems, thanks to our friends at Buchroeders Jewelry. Look

Since the Center's opening in 1990, the society has received and preserved over 23,000 historic artifacts, 516,000 photographic negatives of the community's people and places, 2,000 historic garments, and more than 1,000 works of art. The Center's exhibits and collections have been recognized in the last five years by the American Alliance of Museums, the London Guardian newspaper, and the Smithsonian's American History Museum. All of us have a lot to be proud of!

100 years of collecting, preserving, exhibiting, and interpreting the history of our county.

Last month Columbia's new architectural historic preservation nonprofit was active on several fronts.

On March 5, members attended the Historic Preservation Commission meeting to advocate for the sale of architectural salvage accumulated by the city. On March 20 CoMo Preservation hosted author Greg Olson who gave a well-received talk about indigenous Missourians and the importance of place. Members

attended the McKinney Building public feedback session on March 21, supporting the city's effort to find the best use of the building.

Looking forward, on April 23 at 6 p.m., we host Verna Laboy in the Friends Room at the Columbia Public Library. She will bring to life renowned African American businesswoman Annie Fisher, highlighting the importance of historic preservation. Also, don't miss our Movie Theaters Through Time Tour on Saturday April 27, 10 a.m. -12 p.m. in Downtown Columbia; it's free but reservations are required.


### **Packed House for Mel West for March Speaker Series**



A few adults lay on dirty blankets spread over the concrete floor. It recalled kindergarten, the irrepressible whispers and giggles. Getting away with something so small as not sleeping, so inconsequential, until a deeper sleep exploded and legs kept running as they lay on their backs.

The Historical Research Library at BCHS serves as a research room, as well as the accession area for donations. Vertical files contain extensive information on rural schools, churches, citizens, towns, businesses, and numerous

other subjects. Our museum software contains listings for over 23,000 items that we have in our collection. The library is available for research on Thursday, Friday and Saturday afternoons, 12 to 5, with an appointment preferred in advance. We are located in the Montminy Gallery area.

### **Montminy Gallery Update**

In March and April, the University of Missouri's School of Visual Studies alumni are exhibiting their works in the Montminy Gallery. Their *Concentricity* exhibit is a showcase focusing on the artistic talent of Mizzou SVS alumni, and it displays and contrasts the diversity of styles from dozens of those Mizzou graduates.

One such artist is David Spear, who is based in Columbia. Spear is show-casing his oil painting, *Gum*, which features a pink blob with several grooves and folds. *Gum* is both vivid in color and technique, as well as fascinating. It draws in the viewer and beckons them to gaze at elements like the lighting accents and the soft nuances – then pushes them away with its more aggressive features, like bubbles of saliva covering the discarded piece of chewing gum!

Please make plans to see our next show, For the Love of Locals, which opens May 4! For the Love of Locals debuted two years ago in the Montminy and was such a smash we thought it should be reprised. It is a celebration of artistic talent in Columbia, and it's executed by local portrait artists who have been invited to paint or draw some of our community's most prominent artists and art leaders – whether musicians or poets or visual artists. The portrait artists invited to participate are Lisa Braman Bartlett, Kevin Dingman, Jane Mudd, Jeff Rogers, and Amy Stephenson.

Lisa Braman Bartlett is the For the Love of Locals guest curator and she has invited several musicians who are featured in the portraits to perform at the May 4 opening reception (2:00 m - 4:00 pm).
